10. Justification

Whilst the issue of funeral poverty needs to be considered under sections 20 and 63 of the Burial and Cremation (Scotland) Act 2016, a local authority may charge such fees as the authority thinks fit for burial, cremation and other related services. The option for the charge of an interment to be based on full cost recovery ensures the service is not subsidised by council tax payers and is self-sustainable

The proposal is still proportionate in a wider sense based on the need for the service to be self-sustaining.
